Ramblings from the Chair

Well, happy Spring everybody. I hope you've been enjoying your running through the 'drought'. We've just done three rather wet events in a row: LEI Summer League at Charnwood South, DVO Summer League at Elvaston Castle and then bog snorkelling around Linford Woodlands and John's Lee Wood.

I want to return to one or two themes from my last ramble. The question over membership fees and levies is now clearer, but we now have to decide as a club committee how to accommodate these changes. The text is available on the BOF website, but in terms of levy, it will be £1 per participant at all events (with Juniors counting as 1/3). Up until now, under the current system, most of our Summer/Winter League events have been levy free. Membership will be cheaper, but regular orienteers will be paying more, as it seems that we will have to put up event costs in some way to cope with the new levies. The theory is that total cost of membership will be more proportional to events done.

Talking of the cost to take part in an event, we sometimes hark back to "the old days", and were amused at a recent Winter League event because newer orienteers were surprised at having to have a pen available to compete and write things down en route. I've not been around in orienteering for as many decades as some, but still remember what it was like before technology came to help. Gradually, electronics came in (SI in our case), which also brought new possibilities for course planning and easier result production; we started to produce pre-printed maps (so no copying the course down while kneeling in the wet grass) and then maps on waterproof paper, so there is no need to even put it

into a waterproof bag. Compared with the days of copying your own course down from a master map as part of your course time, and using pin punches, things have moved on significantly, and everyone now expects electronic timing, even at Level D events. Of course, these changes have come at a cost, but have also made improvements to participation in the sport. Hopefully, however we decide to collect the new levies, you will all still feel that orienteering is good value for money (despite the weather).

There have been successes within the club since the last LEI News, many of which will be reported, but I'd like to mention the CompassSport Cup where we had a superb turnout at Cannock. Not sure how our club captain (Roger Phillips) did it, but it was great to see so many LEI members out at the event and having a good day out. I'll be returning to the British Sprints at a later date, but this year's event at York, followed by the British Middles, made an excellent weekend. Podium places were achieved by Finn Lydon and Peter Leake in the Sprints and Euan Tebbutt in the Middles. I'd also like to congratulate Peter Leake for being nominated for the Walton Trophy in the BO Mapping Awards for his new map of Spring Cottage.



Hope to see many of you at an LEI event in 2012, but please don't overtake me too quickly!

the Yvette Baker Trophy/East Midlands League Event on 21st October. The Club Championships is an LEI only event and this year it is at Gresley Woods in the National Forest. I have been told by the planner that the courses will offer a real test of orienteering to find LEI's champions. As in previous years, the format will be a variety of age-specific courses, followed by a formal presentation at the post event social. See the club website for further details.

This is a new location, recently mapped by Peter Leake, the north of the area which was used last year for the Club Championships. It is a large area with a mixture of old woodland with interesting contour detail, new planting and areas of rough open.

Championships Courses will be:

Yellow: M/W10 and under.

Orange: M/W12 and under.

Light Green: M/W14 and under. W60+

Green: M/W18 and under. M60+ and W20 to W55

Blue: M20 to M55.

The event will use SI punching.

Registration will be from 10.30am to 11.30am, with starts from 11.00am to 12.00 noon. This is a closed event, restricted to club members.

Post event there will be presentations and a buffet lunch in The Navigation Inn at 1.30pm. The cost of the buffet is included in the event fee.

Event Fees: Seniors £6, Juniors £3, Digger Hire £1.00

Letter from America No. 3

LEI NEWS Overseas Correspondent: Recon Training in Moss Park and Split Oak Forest

The humidity levels reduce considerably in Florida from October onwards. Temperatures are still in the high 80s/low 90s (F), but mornings and evenings are much more bearable. The torrential rainfalls, thunder and lightning have also reduced in frequency. Although they tend to create havoc on the roads, with axle deep water in places, these spectacular lightning storms are relatively short lived, hence the surprise at the day-long rain that accompanied the October Florida Orienteering club event at Moss Park country park. As soon as I left Tampa on the Inter State 4 route towards Orlando, it was clear from the grey skies and breaching the wall of rain that it was going to be a wet day. As ever, the wet weather plan was just to get wet, but I was in for a surprise.

Florida is fairly low lying in most places. Not surprisingly, they take hurricane season seriously. The only problem is that everyone's evacuation plans all lead to the same few areas of safer, higher ground. Moss Park is equally low lying and is surrounded by lakes. It doesn't take much rain for a carpet of ankle deep water to emerge. Ironically, I felt at home: I could have been at an orienteering event in the Lake District, Wales or the Scottish Highlands. Then I crossed the causeway between controls 1 and 2 into the Split Oak Forest part of the Red course (at over 8 km, it was more akin to a short brown or long blue). I looked down the obvious ride between controls 2

and 3 and saw a newly formed stream. Undaunted, I ploughed on (like everyone else who had travelled long distances to the event). However, wet weather orienteering reached a new depth – literally. Very quickly I was wading along this forest ride in up to waist deep water, wondering whether any stray alligators lay ahead.

Amongst the nearly 2000 channels on offer on the TV at my flat, there is one called the Military Channel. Like all the channels, it features many repeat offerings (beware this repeat curse undermining the BBC). One of them is a series called "Surviving the Cut". All very formulaic, a bunch of soldiers or marines are put through their paces over some 60 or so days to earn the right to wear the Ranger, Recon or some other specialist military badge and be a part of an elite



squad. Invariably, less than a third of the original course intake makes it successfully to the end. As I made my way along the ride, it was strangely reminiscent of one of the scenes from an episode I saw about soldiers undergoing selection for "recon". Then I thought,

"Wouldn't this be an excellent LEI OC canoe-O event!"



Appointments

As some members of LEI may have become aware, following the posting on the National website on Thursday 5th April, 2012, Chris Phillips, who has recently stood down as Chairman of LEI, has been selected to be a member of the new Events & Competitions Committee (E&CC) for British Orienteering. Knowing Chris Phillips as so many of us do will not be a surprise, but I thought that it would be worthwhile to let members of the club have some background information to the appointment.

Late last year, British Orienteering asked for applications from suitably qualified individuals to fill six places on the Committee – four in the first instance, followed by two more at a later date.

Twelve people completed the extensive application form, complete with CV and personal statement. The selection panel consisted of Mike Forrest (Chair of E&CC), Scott Collier (BO Director), Helen Errington (BO Events Manager), Dave Peel (BO Events Manager) and myself, representing the twelve Regions. Prior to our deliberations, I made it known that I would stand back as far as possible from the initial deliberations of any applicant from within EMOA, but would take an active part from then onwards. The selection panel, after very detailed discussion and debate based on previously agreed criteria, which covered a wide range of requirements and expectations, selected the first four – Keith Downing (SMOC/EAOA), Graham Gristwood (SHUOC/SEOA), David May (SWOC/WOA) and Katy Stubbs (BKO/SCOA).

British Orienteering then sought further applications and/or nominations and asked the remaining eight from the original twelve to confirm their

applications. Two withdrew their applications and the six were then joined by an application from one other, namely Chris Phillips.

Following further intensive discussions, Barry Elkington (OD/WMOA) and Chris Phillips (LEI/EMOA) were selected. Each of the six selected applicants have a wide range of skills and experiences, both within orienteering from grassroots community activities to international competition, and in various aspects in their working lives outside of orienteering. The other applicants who have not been selected for the E&CC have all been asked if they are prepared to be considered for membership of any groups, sub-committees or working parties that will be set up, with approval from the British Orienteering Board, following the initial meeting of E&CC on 21st April and other meetings thereafter.

It must be noted from the outset that the members of E&CC do not specifically represent either their club or the Regional Association – they are representing British Orienteering as a corporate group and, as such, will have a responsibility to orienteers throughout the UK. Needless to say, we will learn of their meeting discussions and decisions in due course.

Finally, we can wish Chris Phillips and the other members of E&CC 'Good Luck' and appreciate that if any of them says something such as, "I hear what you say and it has definitely been noted, but at the present time I cannot possibly comment", then we should accept at face value that they actually mean it. As Peter Hornsby has commented, "Now the hard work starts!".

Junior Spotlight 3: Interland 2012

Interland is a competition with an English team competing against two Belgian teams (Flemish and French speaking), a Northern French team, the Dutch and the Nordrhein-Westfalische (NW Germany). The competition is truly a team effort spanning age groups from top year W and M14 to W and M60+: 42 team members in all.

After some successful selection races, I was pleased to be selected for the competition in the south of Belgium. The team members were from clubs all over England, though the North West seemed to be well represented.

On the Friday, Richard Robinson drove Nick Malbon and me (Richard and Nick are both from NOC) down to the rendezvous at Beaconsfield. The whole team then travelled by coach to Dover. After a short, 90 minute crossing, we drove to a youth hostel in Belgium.

After a short trip back into France on Saturday, we took part in the "Citadelle de Montmèdy" middle distance event as a warm-up. The "H. Espoirs" race consisted of a short section around the Citadelle followed by a treacherous run down the 100m high hillside.

There were then a number of controls in the town below the Citadelle. This was followed by a slog back up to the Citadelle and then a quick sprint around the Citadelle and its numerous candlelit

passageways! The age classes were different from ours with a mixture of M15 and M14. I was 7th overall but 2nd M14, which was a good warm-up.

On the Sunday we had an early start (all the M14s managed to sleep through their alarms!) to drive from our accommodation in an ADEPS centre to the event area at Habay la Neuve in Belgium. The area has been used previously for a middle distance world cup race. It is a very runnable forest, with not much complex contour detail but plenty of intricate point features – charcoal burning platforms, pits and tiny clearings. As we were using Emit, the start was very different from what I am used to: everybody had a start control which was next to their map bag. This was to enable a fast way of starting with Emit where you put the brick in 5 seconds before you start and then, when you take it out, the timer starts. After a challenging course, both physically and technically, I was thrilled to come in 3rd with a time of 35:23 for a 4.1 km course.

With a number of successful results, England came 1st overall and in the junior category, both of which my result counted for.

Finally, after 12 hours of travelling, we got back home on Monday morning, all ready for school...

2nd December 1946 to 11th February 2012

A reflection not only on Roger's wide interests, but on the great respect, affection and esteem that he was held in by so many people.





Out and About

One thing I have not been of late is out and about. A stubborn back problem has curtailed my activities more than a little, although I have walked around the odd orienteering course. As I pen this, I am just off to Connemara for a week's walking holiday with my climbing club and

with our Chairman as my guest. Kill or cure is a term that springs to mind, coupled with drowning rats, given recent weather. More of Ireland later.

Statistics being compiled for the last year show depressing signs for several bird species. In the last 50 years hen harriers



have been re-colonising England despite the activities of gamekeepers on the grouse moors. Last year, however, there were only four successful breeding pairs, and they are close to vanishing from England for the second time. The four successes were all on the Bowland moors in Lancashire. Another species rapidly vanishing is the Turtle Dove - down 95% over the last half century. Habitat and food sources in England are a major problem for them, but changing habitats in Africa where they migrate to, and from, are also a problem, and as always they are hunted as they fly between these areas.

Farming practices have put lots of farmland birds at risk, in particular once fairly common Skylark, Grey Partridge, Yellow Wagtail, Lapwing and Corn Bunting. The first two of these are doing quite well locally, as the transition from once arable or pasture land to the new National Forest takes place. Until the newly planted trees suppress the wild grassland understorey, it is ideal terrain for them, which does show they have a capacity for fighting back if we can recreate suitable habitats for them.

There are over fifty species in Britain causing real concern. Amongst woodland species, the Tree Pipit, Wood Warbler, Lesser Redpoll, Hawfinch, Lesser Spotted Woodpecker, and Willow and Marsh Tits are in trouble. Recent widespread breeding failures have raised worries about important seabird populations, especially Roseate Terns, Arctic Skuas and perhaps, surprisingly, the Herring Gull. Even that most iconic of visitors, the Cuckoo, is in decline. One bright spot on the horizon is the Black Grouse. Still fairly desperately clinging on with man's help, in those areas where it has been re-introduced, the population in the north of England doubled last year to 1,000 birds.

One find which may interest you was close to Clapham where my climbing club has one of its cottages - signs of early residents of the dales have been uncovered by members of the Ingleborough Archaeology Group. After weeks investigating a remote site on the slopes of Ingleborough to the west of Selside, they discovered the first seventh-century construction to be positively identified in the park – and one of the first in the north of England.

They uncovered a small, rectangular, partly stone-built building with two rooms, and in it found sixteen pieces of charcoal impressed into the compacted soil floor. Two of these were sent for radiocarbon dating and returned identical dates – between AD 660 and 780, which puts the end of the site's use firmly within the Anglo-Saxon period. That makes this building the only firmly-dated, post-Roman archaeological site in Ribblesdale, which is of more than local significance. They also found small pieces of chert, the dark, rock-like flint that was knapped to make small tools, and these are likely to date from the early Neolithic period, possibly 6,000 years ago, and it was probably pure chance that the pieces found their way into the building – they may have been trapped in turfs used for sealing the walls or roof.

Members have this year again stayed at my club's Little Langdale Cottage for the British Champs, and if any group of members wishes to use either property they should contact me.

I would like to turn to the Brand now as I have just finished remapping it and, in the process, have researched matters that I did not previously know. I also dug about in the annals to explain it to members of my club when I organised a meet for them in the National Forest. A 13 mile Charnwood circular for the walking members passed by the Brand. Old



climbing guides talk of the larger quarry in the garden - "this crag-like quarry offers some very fine climbing on steep, often perfect, slate. The setting is idyllic, especially in the sun on a summer's evening. The rock is smooth but blocky, some of the blocks having razor sharp edges. The routes are long." This garden is also an area of special scientific interest because of rare lichens and other plant rarities.

Before the enclosures, each year stock used to be driven off the hills of Charnwood Forest to places on the edge, to be marked with the brands of the owners. The Brand was one such place. Slate quarrying was a growth industry in the Brand area in the 17th and 18th centuries, with the product being used for headstones, gate posts, buildings, walling and flagstones. Swithland slate is still in high demand for matching work, as it is almost indestructible. The Brand is almost like something out of Lord of the Rings, as those of you who have run in there will know. The quarrying works cut the solid slate hill into a myriad of large and small quarry workings, and pumping stations were built; rivers were diverted and on one level the area could be said to be a mess. Eventually, however, quarrying ceased and the owners of the Big House landscaped the site, amongst other things, by part filling the middle of a long, thin quarry to give Trout Water and Perch Water (the main climbing quarry). The Brand Estate was sold to the Martins in 1887, and further landscaping has been done and the area allowed to naturalise. You now have an ecological oddity rich in wildlife, but with streams appearing to run through rock faces and complexity of landforms, such that people get lost in there without any difficulty at all! I have. Ten foot high bracken in areas does not help. I cannot imagine any area of a similar size having so many landform features. The land is strictly

private, but any reasonable approach is usually accommodated and we are always welcome. I have bumped into scouts, pond dippers, twitchers, bug collectors and all manner of people in there. One good reason for asking permission is that shooters are also allowed in occasionally.

Going further afield, the government has announced the route of the first stretch of the English coastal path, bringing the vision of a continuous coastal path one step closer to reality. The path runs around Weymouth Bay and we can only hope the government can find the fairly modest monies to press on with the next stages of this exciting project and bring the benefits to the rest of England. The Minister responsible has, however, warned about holding our breath. The 870 mile (1,400 km) all-Wales coastal path is now complete and will be officially opened in May.

The path stretches from the Dee Estuary in north east Wales, west to Anglesey, Gwynedd, and down the south west Wales coast, going east to Cardiff and Newport, with views over the Bristol Channel. It is as near to the coast as legally and physically practicable, and in tourist speak, "The Coast Path winds its way through towns and villages, across cliff tops and sandy beaches, sometimes darting inland before emerging once again at a sheltered cove or tiny hamlet that you would forever miss when travelling by car, bus or train."

Good news from the White Peak! The threat hanging over the Roaches appears to have been removed. On the market since last year, this area has now been withdrawn from sale and the local Wildlife Trust has taken out a 125 year lease on it. The Trust has undertaken to keep it open to walkers, etc.

Magnetic Storms at Brereton Spurs

Well, we all know that a poor workman blames his tools... BUT

At the Compass Sport Cup at Brereton Spurs on 19th February, a number of us felt that something funny was going on with our compasses. My compass was rotating erratically and I vowed that I would log on and purchase a posh one like Nigel's immediately after I got home. It wasn't until we were making our excuses later in the pub that we realised that each of us was not alone.

After 16 years as a Geophysicist measuring and making maps of the Earth's magnetic field, I felt sure that I must be able to come up with a valid excuse for my tragic performance for the club that we'd only just joined!

So, there are three likely causes:

1. The company that makes very large magnets for the military, down on the industrial estate on the edge of the town.


Their website didn't give too much away for obvious reasons.

2. Geology. Coal measures don't usually produce a magnetic anomaly and there are no other suspicious features on the local geology map.

3. Magnetic Storm Activity. We are currently at the peak of an eleven year cycle for magnetic storm activity. Coronal mass ejections send high energy charged particles towards Earth that connect with the Earth's Magnetic Field, and stream into the North and South Magnetic Poles. The Northern Lights have been spotted as far South as Northumberland, which has not happened since the 1960s. On the 19th February, Sunspot regions 1402 and 1401 (ooh, those two!) were active and produced a sudden onset of a magnetic storm that began in the USA at 00.42 and was classed as a G1 magnetic storm (proper big 'un). I have not found out what time it hit Brereton Spurs

because no-one was recording there, but by way of consolation, the BGS were recording at Keyworth and the Kp index was twice as bad on the 22nd Feb!

An ex-colleague at BAS confirmed to me that the largest magnetic deflection that he can imagine to an orienteering compass under these conditions might be up to 8 degrees. Does that get me off the hook for that performance? And in anyone's language red stripes on a graph must be bad.

So, if I call him Ironman, it's not because he is like Robert Downey Jr. from the Ironman film, nor is it because he has swum 2.4 miles in open water, jumped on a bike and cycled 112 miles and finally run 26.2 miles. No, it's because he has become fascinated by pylons and the little yellow figures working in this dangerous environment.

There is a Pylon Appreciation Society with a field guide to British Electricity Pylons at £15 life membership. I could not resist putting his name forward and I am now waiting for the welcome pack with photocards, a 10" x 8" print called 'parts of a pylon', minicards and a metal badge. Junior members receive a word search and instructions on how to draw a pylon, too. There is a photo gallery of exhibition images taken by a lady photographer called Flash, from Leytonstone.

To celebrate Andrew's 30th birthday at the end of April, the Marriott clan (John, Irene, Andrew, Suzi and Edd) went for a short break to Center Parcs, Longleat, Wiltshire. On the long journey, Ironman found it impossible not to look at, and comment on, the pylons.

From Center Parcs, John still found time to go orienteering at Grovely Hill, organised by Sarum O. They were very interested at Registration to see that John has replaced the battery in his emit card- there is sticky red glue on it (which dribbled down my Fairy Liquid bottle, too). Is he starting a revolution for orienteers who want to change the battery themselves?? I wander through the area, photograph some amazingly shaped tree trunks and then wait at the finish where I am amused by the number of people covered in sticky burrs. John, too, has his share of sticky burrs. Isn't nature's way of spreading seeds fascinating?

John spends his time at Center Parcs keeping up with Edd and Andrew, as they go swimming, biking and on the high-in-the-trees ropes course which ends with a zip wire across the lake.

What a horrid, miserable, wet start to 25th April, the day of the summer league event at Charnwood

Forest South, organised by Retired Man. Wednesday night is Brownies and Guides night and I have secretly arranged to have the evening off, so John is very pleased, but surprised, to see me, bringing hot coffee and helping out with registration under the Christmas tree shelter. From the panoramic view on the hilltop, the dark shower clouds can be seen rolling in, but there is another drama unfolding. Most folks have gone home or to the Bradgate Arms in Cropston for curry night. It's getting late, going dark and there is still one woman out there orienteering while her friend waits in the car. John, Chris Bosley and the Christmas tree man start to search, but the woman soon emerges. Too late and too dark to bring in any more controls, we head for the pub and are grateful they are still serving curry.

In the pub, much discussion follows about the lost woman. Would anyone have formed a search party now that they were changed into dry clothes and sunk a few pints? When do you call 999? Getting lost on a daytime course is not so bad as it is not about to go dark. Bringing in controls does not help any lost person to relocate themselves.

He must have searched the car and all those kites and canes at least four times. The start box was eventually found inside his wet O shoes and now he could begin to process the results data.

When do you call 999?

Thursday evenings find me helping out the Duke of Edinburgh teams at Rawlins College, Quorn. On 3rd May, I recognise someone reading the notice board: it's Ursula. She has come along to help.

Retired man has been trying out a map and compass GPS application from a chap in North Carolina, USA. "It can't be working properly, it thinks I'm at the North Pole." More consultation: "now it's the South Pole." Even more adjustments gives 'latitude 0 degrees, longitude 0 degrees' which is.....I do know where, but leave my readers to find out for themselves. A little more consultation and at last the app puts John in Cropston and he can set off walking round the block and near the pylons, putting in more data. He is hoping to use the app to simulate O

events, both normal and radio orienteering.

He has made a virtual radio O course by finding the bearings for our local pylons and using them as radio O controls. The pylons have been given Ironman codes PX1, PX2, etc


