On Sunday 12th November 2023. more than 30 LEI members made their way to New Beechenhurst for the CompassSport Trophy final. Some made the trip starting in Leicestershire in the early hours of

the Sunday morning, whilst others made a weekend of it, enjoying fine weather on Saturday, by all accounts. The very late parking changes, the instruction to fill cars to the brim with bodies, were a real headache for some members but fortunately this did not prevent people getting to the event.

Sunday's weather was not great, but at least the rain, for the most part, held off until courses closed. The area had clearly seen a lot of rain previously as it was very muddy in parts. It was very heavy going and, in some parts, notably the hills in the North-Western part of the terrain, aka 'The Slides', were downright dangerous. Beat The Street

No not the latest music scene but Orienteering with a difference. Beat the Street is an orienteering game for none orienteers. Beat the Street is very much like an Orienteering Score with the aim to visit as many controls as possible in a fixed time.

Beat the Street was developed by Dr William Bird, a GP who wanted to get people active, ditch the car and to get communities walking together. Since it was developed in 2010, more than 1.5m people have played the game across more than 100 towns and cities across the UK and internationally.

Leicester City Council has in the past organised several Beat the Street Events. An approach from the City Council to Roger Edwards, LEI's Development Coordinator to help organise an event in the October School Half Term saw several members of LEI swing in to action in a windy car park by the Hamilton Tesco. The timing of the event in the half term holiday was designed to link in with Leicester City Councils range of activities for families.

The activity used the Map Run App which, apart from being appealing to the younger members of the public taking part, saved the small team helping Roger the chore of putting out controls and collecting them in.

Basic Orienteering instructions was given by the LEI team before we let the 45 attendees off in to the wilds of Hamilton. As folk who are used to running

round forest and moors with nothing more than a map and compass to guide us, we forget that for most non orienteers how much this is a step into the unknown and how much some of them are outside their comfort zone.

Given the favourable response from our guests I think we can count the day as a success. I understand that if funding is available Leicester City Council is intending repeating the activity. If you have a spare morning during the October half term perhaps you will help Roger to introduce some new comers to the sport.

Events Co-ordinator

Since the last newsletter and at the time of writing we have held regional events at Irchester, Martinshaw and Bagworth and the first few races of the Winter League. As always, I am immensely thankful to the organisers, planners and controllers for the hard work they put into the events and also to all the volunteers for helping on the day. Both Martinshaw and Bagworth had much higher numbers of competitors than anticipated, which is good for us as a club and possibly for our sport too. It is also notable that the Beacon Hill event in December was a Winter League event with well over 100 people turning up. This is quite a jump from expected numbers of 50 or so and we may have to rethink the jobs of our minor league organisers. As we look forward to the rest of this year and beyond, we have the East Midlands Championships to hold in Feb 2025, and, imminently, the JK Sprint day in 2024more of that below.

LEI at the 2024 JK

The JK is the premier festival of orienteering in the UK and to be responsible for any part of it is a great honour for both the individuals concerned and LEI itself. Chris. Ursula. Simon and others have responsibilities across the days, but the club's big task is Day 1-The Sprint at Loughborough University. I am the day organiser and as I work on campus, within 100m of the finish of the courses, this makes the task a little easier for me than others. Steves Edgar and Chafer are the planners and the controller and IOF advisors, for it is to be a World Ranking Event, come from outside the Club-Simon Errington from HH, and Ronan and Julie Cleary from LOK.

For the past two years we have examined the campus for start and finish locations, negotiated with the University for food provision and Peter Hornsby had mapped all the constant construction and demolition that happens on a modern University campus.

I am writing after having spent the day entertaining the controller and advisor for a site visit. They have checked all the control sites, the start, the assembly area and the finish arena. All is looking good.

Teams are coming together and I expect to have to arrange 100 volunteers taking on jobs, from start team, finish team, download, enquiries, sales, putting out equipment, car parking, prize presentation and lastly, but not least, control collecting and tidying away.

It's Tuesday night in September, RM is to run round the streets of Coalville, (Greenhill) and eat out at Spoons. Oh dear, he struggles with the gaps on the map trying to decide which ones are closed off. RM gloats that someone else was in 'run to the finish' mode and unfortunately missed the last control.

Later that week it's the Irchester event. It's rather a long way to travel and may account for the low number of competitors. Perhaps an orienteer saw the rare butterfly the Purple Emperor that has made its home in Irchester as it thrives in mature broadleaved forests with sunny rides. The caterpillars feed on sallow willow. However adult male butterflies prefer to descend from the leaf canopy to drink from puddles and eat dog pooh. Lovely. RM does not see the butterfly but does see Alistair Powell and discovers that Alistair is high in the world rankings for Mountain Bike Orienteering. Well done, Alistair.

By Tuesday 26th Sept the nights are drawing in and perhaps head torches might be needed at the Hamilton event. RM reports that he got a bit lost near the finish but was not running in the dark.

Back home his main comment, was his conversation with Ursula. 'What League??' replied RM when Ursula reports that he is currently top of the Green Male section. Ursula oversees the East Midlands League results. Investigations show RM is followed by 2 DVO orienteers Paul Goodhead and John Hurley but no one else has finished 7 events. He is now condemned to running green courses; had he been aware, he would not have competed on blue at Irchester.

On 1st October RM returns from Rivelin Valley East. Oh dear, three quarters of the way through his run, the sole fell off his fairly new running shoes. He finished with one foot feeling as if he was running in a slipper. But more problems are to come as he goes to Download to pick up Peter Hornsby's car keys but no car keys can be found. Pete Leake arrives and still no car keys. It's raining and cold so they shelter in the very nearby pub, where a kind SYO orienteer buys RM a hot coffee. Peter Hornsby finishes his run, no he the kevs. thev hasn't aot have disappeared from download, someone must have taken them by mistake. When RM tells me this story its 'Some WOMAN must have taken them' 'And what evidence have you for this? 'Well women can't tell one car or car keys from another' 'Could it have been a child?? 'Well may be.' Oh dear, no phones, no clean clothes, no sandwiches, they are all locked in the car. The 3 friends are plotting how to get back to Leicester when one of the download team brings a set of keys to the pub. Was it a woman?? We will never know, unless the reader can help??

3rd October is Club night so his road running shoes will be OK for the St Matthew's street event, but he is not very happy when he returns home. The O was 'alright' although some orienteers found St Matthew's estate 'a bit scary'. They were let down by The Blackbird pub where the wait for food would be an hour. To another pub where the beer was icy cold and expensive and the food not up to Spoon's standards. But worse is to come; his results suggest he has missed out the first control.



It's Friday Oct 6th and RM's new O shoes have arrived in the post but they don't seem wide enough. He has 2 events this weekend and needs shoes. 'Where's the strong cotton?' 'Have you got a thimble?' 'What about some webbing?'

I successfully search through various drawers so he is all equipped to mend the stitching on the top half of the shoe that fell apart last week. But when he puts the sole in place it is much longer than the top half. Plan B: glue and gaffer tape an even older O shoe from his collection of well loved, well worn out shoes that he cannot bear to throw away.

Saturday and it's the club champs and a buffet meal in the Blackfordby village hall. His shoes did not fall apart and he was 2nd in the 75's and has a certificate to prove it. George Normand won.

Sunday, the O event is at Longshaw and on his return, RM is feeling old, very old. He explains that the start was half way up a steep hill and then even more climbing was involved to reach the controls. He stared at the steep hill he still had to climb and despaired 'Why am I doing this?'

Is he suffering from Bathmophobia? No, not a fear of having a bath but '**Bathmophobia**', an extreme fear of stairs or slopes, such as a steep hill. "Bathmo" is the Greek word for steps, while "phobos" means fear.

15th October and the O-Ing is at Grantham. RM shows me a white spot on the map 'That's the Grantham Oak' he said. 'No, he had not had time to read the plaque as he ran past'. Research reveals that The Grantham Oak is over 500 years old with a girth: 7.02 metres and is one of 13 trees nominated for Tree of the Year in 2023 by The Woodland Trust. A few weeks later the winning tree is announced as a sweet chestnut in Acton Park, Wrexham RM had organised the club night at Beaumont Leys. I think some folks got lost in the housing estate. Afterwards to avoid another pub without any beer it's back to Chris and Ursula's house near the chip shop.

RM did not read the instructions about parking for Donisthorpe. While everyone else has a long walk from official parking location, RM 'cheats' and parks near the start. Someone else (CB) must not have read GO TO DOWNLOAD as he had set off home but returns after phone contact is made.

I can never understand why an important inter club event such as CompassSport is held on Remembrance Sunday, there must have been orienteers involved with uniformed organisations such as Scouts and Guides who could not make it to New Beechenhurst and their possible winning points were lost. The day before, RM's preparation had been to do nothing but sit on the settee all day with crosswords and puzzles - 'I'm saving myself for tomorrow'. The day after the event I had to dig out RM's splinters and rub Vanish on his O clothes.

25th November is my birthday and I am in my dressing gown and slippers about to take a shower when John says 'Chris Bosley is outside, did I want to look at his car as it's the same as the one I might be getting?' 'No. Not in my dressing gown and slippers!' I reply, 'Why is CB here?' 'I don't know' replies John as he steps outside to ask. He soon returns all flustered, 'It's today not tomorrow, Linacre is today' and rushes off to get ready.

Needing some new running shoes, yesterday he had shopped at Decathlon in Nottingham and also nearby IKEA for my little birthday presents. I unwrapped 3 bars of Swedish Chocolate and a gingerbread house. IKEA furniture comes

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flat packed and so did the gingerbread house. No need to check that all the screws and fittings were present as the gingerbread house is to be fixed together with icing sugar (not included).

The Royal Oak at Cossington has met with approval for Après O after the Sileby event where RM had won the event. He had been checking the start list all day to see who might beat him.

RM is keen to find warm clothes to wear for Martinshaw Woods as we have had some snow and he will be manning the late start as well as running a green course. He is now obsessed with this green course league calculating with one event to go if he might win the trophy. Can anyone else gain enough points to overtake him? its reminiscent of football where your team has to win and the rival team has to lose by a goal difference of 3 etc. etc.

Roy Denney had organised a Plaid Coalville eat/ drink/ talk orienteering evening in The Plough at Ratby. An enjoyable evening was had by all and we all went home with big parcels. Later we discovered we had been given various guide books to walks courtesy of Stan. (Roy's walking /drinking mate) and Roy's Charnwood map. Must have taken a lot of time and wrapping paper. Thank you, Roy.

RM had been 'volunteered' to plan the courses at Bagworth in the New Year. He returns from the area saddened. The map is not right, more areas are just not runnable; but he has found a plastic chair and will use it on the map as man-made object. A few days later I have an invitation 'Can you pull my trousers off '. RM has been to Bagworth checking for control sites and been the victim of vicious brambles. He has a bloody head, jeans ripped at the knees, muddy bum and so very cold he cannot take these dirty clothes off.

The EM league is reaching a critical stage, RM reckons he wasted 8 minutes at Strawberry Hill. Is he still winning the EM league green course, the best of 8 events to score?

The trophy presentations are to take place at Bagworth but first his courses need checking with Peter Hornsby who is the Controller. They make plans to meet at the pub 'after Peter has watched some football, Leicester v Cardiff. The next day RM takes my secateurs and the bolt croppers to clear some paths at Bagworth.

The New Year's Day event is at Pooley Fields but oh dear, John returns muddy, cold and wet but even worse with a pulled leg muscle. Time for the ice pack treatment. He is worried about being able to put out the controls for Bagworth coming up this weekend but thankfully Roger Phillips volunteers for the task.

RM will go to Bagworth tomorrow not to run but to receive his EM Green Man Champion trophy... but first he has to take down the Xmas tree and put the baubles away. I ask if he found the spare chocolate snowmen and Santa decorations and he owns up to having eaten them. Typical! Happy New Year,

Lost & Found

Lost and Found...

One way and another it has been a bit of a year. Back on 23rd May, I set up my Summer League event, a Norwegian type event on Castle Hill Park, and by the time I was putting out the fourth control I realised I no longer had my integrated thumb compass and magnifier.

Can't have gone far, I thought, so the day after, I walked round all my control sites and picked up odd bits of left over tape and string/map clues left hanging in the trees. No sign of my compass. Oh dear. Never mind. I know I lost it before putting out control four. I walked round again a few days later. Still no sign. I struggled through the rest of the summer league. White Rose, club champs, CompassSport Cup and Trophy Final and several EMOA League and Urban events with a plain old compass, no magnifier but with a big bubble in it, and after the visit to Beechenhurst, a very large crust of driedup mud all over it.

On attending a winter League event on a dark November night, I felt another Club colleague's pain as they told me they had lost a hearing aid putting out the controls in the park. That put my loss into perspective. Do you have any idea how much they cost? Arm and a leg job! Better start saving now, all you youngsters!... Found, later, attached to a woolly hat! Phew!

All through the Autumn, my sister, ill with terminal cancer, stayed with us, and there was little time to go out when it wasn't pouring down. Any time the sun shone; we pushed my sister round in a wheelchair in any flat park we could find. In November, I "lost" my sister. I mean, I know where she is, but eventually, after the funeral and the clearing up, on

Christmas Eve. seven months after I lost my compass, I ventured back out onto Castle Hill Park again, in a mist of heavy drizzle and with much skating over the sodden ground. First control site, five minutes from my front door, there was my compass, half buried in the mud! The long grass had been mown down so it was now obvious. It was missing a complete thumb strap, whether mown through or chewed by an animal, I'm not sure, but after giving it a good wash, and then with search through а my needlework box it was complete with new strap and as good as new.

meantime. However. in the other members of my family were having a similar set of difficulties to me, So if you, or an orienteering friend or relation should happen to be walking in Burbage Woods, Leicestershire, in the area of woodland close to the café and find a baseplate compass. or between Download and the campervan parking of the last day of the White Rose and find a type 5 dibber, or possibly walking in the Forest of Dean at Mallard's Pike North, in the presumably flattened by now, bracken NW of control 8 and SW of the lake, on the Blue Course on Day 1 (see NGOC website) and find a bright red SIAC dibber, three close relatives of mine would be very pleased to hear from vou! Now I know how you all love a treasure hunt...
