Captain's Corner



Despite women being in short supply, LEI managed to field two teams for the British Mixed Sprint Relay Champs at Bury St Edmunds on 30th August. The teams were: 'Speed of LEI-

ght' comprising Steve Edgar, Ursula Williamson and Iain Phillips in 55+, and 'Leading LEI-ghts' comprising Matt White, Karen White and Andy Nicholls in 40+. No doubt they enjoyed their day.

The event I am thinking about most now is the CompassSport Trophy at South Gare, Redcar on the 14th September. As often seems to be the case, the timing of the Newsletter is such that a report on our performance will have to wait until the Spring 2026 issue. However, as of today I am pleased to see a turnout of 31 orienteers ready to do battle with the Northeast coastline for Trophy points. We have runners in all categories, which is essential as the scoring system, which I have given below, demonstrates.

CompassSport Trophy team score

- 13 scores to count
- a maximum of 2 counters from any one of the 'Large' classes 1 to 7.
- a maximum of 2 counters from each pair of the 'Small' CompassSport classes. e.g. two from 8A, none from 8B; one from 8A, one from 8B; none from 8A, two from 8B; etc.
- a maximum of 2 counters from the single 'Small' class 10.

We have been able to cover all categories because Ursula is running up to Women Open class (Blue 6.2 km; 70 m) instead of Veterans (Short Green 3.5 km; 40m). With some extremely good

orienteers in my own category, leaving me no chance of scoring, I too have decided to run up to Short Brown. Ursula and I both hope to 'do a Hague', a nod to Oliver's impressive 92 points in the Clumber Park qualifier which he walked round. We will both be starting early!

This summer I went on two orienteering trips. I did not travel as far as some LEI members who attended the Scottish 6 Days, or the World Masters Orienteering Championships in Girona, Spain. I went to Bradford for the weekend for a parkrun and two sprint races on the Saturday and then a race around Bradford City Centre on Sunday. I stayed in an Airbnb which was someone's converted garage! Sue Bicknell was the only other LEI member there. We had a few chats, of course, and I learned about her very interesting past career.

I also attended my first White Rose weekend in Dalby Forest which was excellent and extremely challenging. Since these events were more than two hours' drive away, I thought I had better get to grips with the gift aid scheme that the club operates. I was surprised to learn at a recent committee meeting that most of the gift aid is generated by only four people but that a lot of income can be gained for the club in this way. To cut a long story short, it was simple to fill the forms in and really did not take much time at all. I encourage you all to help the club out in this way if you travel to a qualifying event.

Schools Orienteering

The North West schools championship was scheduled for March at Donisthorpe. However on the day, contractors were planning to resurface the finish straight. So the event was hastily called off and rescheduled for Monday, 9th June at a new location.

Whitwick and Coalville Leisure centre was used for the second time. Peter Hornsby was the planner with Chris Bosley controlling and supporting. The area is smaller than Donisthorpe and has a big car park at one end, so fitting in the 30 minute score course is a bit of a challenge. On top of this we need a map walk exercise so more of the area needs to be removed.

With the Melton, Belvoir & South Charnwood Schools event being on the previous Friday, equipment had to be delivered early in the morning and fitted ready for a 10 o'clock start.

However we had an experienced team to do the job successfully. Kevin and Andy were again on duty at the back of the centre processing results.

Holy Cross School with their four counting pairs in the first 18 were run away winners, sixty points ahead of the second place team.

The North West Schools partnership commissioned a set of young leaders to manage the map walk and start, and once again they picked some very competent students, so that the club had to give very little support.

With the event being a rerun, numbers (408 pupils) were a lot down on the 28 primary schools which were expected at Donisthorpe. Next year's event will be in late March when we expect numbers to return to close on 800 primary school children; making it probably the biggest schools race in Britain.

Family Fun Day Orienteering & Schools Championships June 2025

In June, Karen and I had the pleasure of putting on, or supporting, four events focused on novices and primary school-age juniors. These included three events in four days over one weekend, and a further event the following weekend.

The first event was the Melton and Belvoir, and Charnwood Schools Championships, organised by the School Sports Physical Activity Network (SSPAN). For the last two years this has been held at Melton Country Park. This year, we moved to the Belvoir Castle Estate, and were supported by the Belvoir Education and Sports Trust. I made a new map of the east ridge of the Belvoir Castle Estate for the event. The event was a thirty-minute score course with 30 controls. The course required navigation by orienting the map and planning the most efficient route. We had over 200 primary school children come to the event, with most of the children having very successful runs.

Two days later, Karen and I put on an event in our local village as part of the Friends of Stathern School summer fete. In Stathern, we have a hilly meadow that is owned by the Leicestershire and Rutland Wildlife Trust, and was perfect for novice orienteering. The map I made for this event also included the adjacent parts of the village, which are virtually car free. The event was again hugely successful and approximately 80 villagers took on the orienteering challenge, mainly as pairs. Several of the teachers who had helped two days before came along and were eager to "have-a-go". Six pairs found all 30 controls and a further five found all but one. There were lots of splits comparisons and eager anticipation of the results announcement afterwards at the BBQ and bar.

The next day was an early start to get the orienteering kit to the Whitwick and Coalville Leisure Centre for the NW Leicestershire Schools Championships. This event was coordinated by Peter Hornsby (planner) and Roger Edwards (organiser), in collaboration with the NW Leicestershire SSPAN. The event has been held for many years, and runs very smoothly. Over 400 children took on the challenge of the 25-control score course, but there was a free-period when some of the "adults" also had a go. Some tried to get the fastest time by using a bike, but didn't manage!

After a much-needed rest, the following week saw the second running of what is hoped will be an annual sports and family fun day run by the Belvoir Education and Sports Trust. Orienteering was the main sports activity of the day, with an A3 map of the Belvoir Castle Estate at 1:10000 scale, and a 30-control score course suitable for all – there were many simple controls in the ornamental gardens close to the start and a few more challenging controls across the estate for the more eager participants. This was another successful event with 70 participants. In particular, there were many people who had taken part in the earlier events and were now bitten by the orienteering bug.

None of this could have been achieved without support from others in LEI and additional support from DVO. In particular, Kevin Bradley helped lots by teaching me the use of the SI Timing software and hardware. Other helpers not mentioned above were Andy Portsmouth, Chris Bosley, Ian Buxton, John Marriott, Andy Nicholls, and Steve Martin. All-in-all this was a busy but hugely rewarding time. There were so many smiling faces, and endless numbers of people enjoying the orienteering.



disqualified missing several controls. He has lost some time after missing control 14 then going back to punch it. But sitting in the sunshine outside Ashby Spoons has cheered him up and he reports back about the impressive alterations at Peter Hornsby's house.

The next day is Aylestone Meadows and reports of a stolen control and a fire engine ???.

Running round Warwick Uni, RM blames a very hot brain that's not working well as he rushes off to the first control without first planning the route. He had also taken the opportunity to visit Cubbington and see the devastation to the countryside by works for HS2 railway.

It's off to Scotland for the Six Days, travelling with Chris B in his electric car and planning recharging points on the long drive. I don't hear much gossip about the event. He has several photos of the luxurious accommodation and a cake for Judith's granddaughter visiting on her birthday. The competition is dominated by Eastern European countries, but David and Robin return home with silver medals for the team event for their age group. Hooray. Going to Gdansk

Gdansk Orienteering weekend June 2025

Having been orienteering abroad a couple of times we were keen to go to Gdansk with Jeff and Tanya.

We didn't get off to the best of starts when Jeff left his phone in the car at the airport; luckily we had arrived early so he had plenty of time to retrieve it.

Once we arrived at Gdansk airport we got through without too much of a wait but when we got out of the building we were told to move away quickly as there had been a couple of incidents and they needed to clear the airport. Unfortunately that meant that there were no trains. trams, buses or taxis into the town. Luckily for us a taxi driver had become aware of the situation, parked his cab as near to the airport as he could and then walked to the airport asking if anyone wanted his services. As we had no idea how long we would have to wait we took him up on his offer, dragging our cases down the road, at speed, trying to keep up with him.

We arrived at our apartment without too many more problems. It was only a short walk away from the main street. We spent the evening and next morning getting our bearings, checking the main area for places that we might want to visit when time permitted us to do so.

DAY 1 event 1 (Friday evening)

When we arrived to collect our bibs we were informed that we hadn't paid so we had to search our phones for our confirmation (the mistake was theirs). It didn't just happen to us, as our friends from EPOC also had the same problem. I was starting to think that they were either not very efficient or didn't like the British.

The area was a pleasant housing estate which turned out to be very intricate,

needing good concentration skills, which I enjoyed enormously.

DAY 2 event 2 (Saturday morning)

It was a sprint event, again, in a different intricate housing estate including a running track and grassy areas. It was so easy to make mistakes and I didn't help things by falling over and needing first aid treatment (they were a very efficient team). The finish was through an underpass so I had Jeff and Kev waiting for me, to take photos and warn me about the e-bikes whizzing past the exit from the underpass.

E-bikes are one of the main modes of transport in Gdansk, alongside the buses and trams, and go really fast everywhere in the City even in the main streets in the town centre.

DAY 2 event 3 (Saturday afternoon)

Another sprint event in a park from the same centre as the morning event. Jeff and I had both decided not to do this one when we entered, and when we saw where the start was we knew we had made the right decision. It was a mass start with 3 different groups (based on age classes) starting 5 minutes apart. As it was a mass start there were different courses for each age class (all going to the same controls but in a different order) so had to be given their own map.

The start was chaos with everyone having to negotiate a deep ditch immediately. Lots of mistakes were made by many competitors. There was a spectator control next to the finish before sending all competitors back out into the park. I almost forgot to mention all the nettles to go through to get to some controls; no prior warning about full leg cover being preferable, although the locals obviously knew about it as they were the only sensibly attired ones.



DAY 3 event 4 (Sunday morning Euro City Race)

We were staying within walking distance of this event but had to allow extra time to cross a bridge that was only open for 30 minutes in every hour (we had to cross it again to get back to the Start so we had to judge how our start times coincided with the opening times of the bridge). As it was a really hot day and no shade at the start, the timing for crossing the bridge was crucial. They were good courses with plenty of opportunities to make route choice errors, which I did, along with a second fall in a very narrow uneven area between buildings. Most courses went through it, making it very congested.

The club were very hospitable providing a great supply of fruit and drinks to keep us going whilst waiting for the presentations and it also gave us time to chat to other competitors from other countries as well as our own.


