2. Membership Numbers

167 members at 25^h October 2006, 2005 figures in brackets (173).

Senior (non-family) 56 (56); Junior (non-family) 6 (3); Affiliated Groups 2 (2); Affiliated Schools 6 (6); Family Groups 34 (37) (comprising 97 members (106)). There are 34 Club only members in the total (39). Age profiles were also produced.

3. Minutes of the 36th Annual General Meeting, 26th October 2005

Approved.

4. Matters Arising

There were no matters arising.

5. Chairman's Report on last year

This was read out by Chris Phillips and will be published in LEI News.

6. Matters Arising

There were no matters arising from the Chairman's Report.

7. Treasurer's Report, Annual accounts 2005/6 and Budget projections 2006/7

The accounts cover the year to 31^{st} July 2006..

There has been a deficit of £1330 as opposed to a £917 surplus in 2005. The 2004/5 accounts only covered a period of 11 months to enable the change of year end date to July 31st. Although event surplus was £2449 on paper, once equipment, mapping and printing was taken into account (£3550), this really represented a deficit of around £1000. However, we have purchased a new A3 printer during the year. Two events made a loss overall, and the Summer League made a surplus of £1000.

The Balance Sheet shows our net current assets as £9,900, and so our reserves are in good order.

Budget Projections:

Membership income is expected to fall, and some of our expenditure is to be reduced by cutting the number of newsletters per year from four to three. Equipment costs will be down as we will only need to depreciate the printer. The predicted deficit is £519.

Helper allowances are to be normalised at 50% of entry cost for C3 and C4 events. Junior C5 entry is to be raised to £1 to match other local clubs. Team entry subsidy is to be reduced from 50% to 33%. The Club needs to take care over event expenditure, and map printing quantities.

8. Auditor's Report

The full Auditor's Report is attached to the official set of accounts.

9. Matters Arising from the Treasurer's Report

There were no matters arising.

10. Approval of Accounts

Proposed by Roy Denney and seconded by Simon Ford: Carried.

11. Proposed Amendment to Constitution

There were two proposed changes, detailed in LEI News. Both are concerning membership categories in line with changes brought forward by BOF. There has been a long process of change, and we are trying to keep up.

Acceptance proposed by Roger Edwards and seconded by Bob Haskins: Carried.

12. President's Report and election of Chairman

Ernie Williams thanked the club officers for their work over the year and explained that the meeting pattern had changed so that there were now only four full committee meetings a year, with subcommittees meeting and discussion taking place in the other months. The club is working well and has good ideas that are often followed by others. We are now just starting the second year of our Winter League, and are making suggestions in the East Midlands for big events. It is excellent news that the junior development section has progresses well over the year.

Chris Phillips was proposed as Club Chairman by Ernie Williams and seconded by Bob Haskins: Approved.

13. New Chairman's Address and plans for the forthcoming year

Chris said that he had served under four different chairmen whilst being on the committee. He highlighted the importance of the development work being done, and led by Judith Holt and Lee Powell. LEI is also moving towards the award of Club Mark. It is hoped that a member of the junior squad will serve on the club committee.

Computing and the internet are important aspects of the club and John Cooke is to go on the computing team along with Kevin Bradley and Andy Portsmouth as Kevin's assistant. Two C3, and four C4 events are planned for 2007. The C4 at Ratby on 25th March 2007 is also to mark the 10th anniversary of the National Forest Trophy. LEI applied to run BOC 2009 but were turned down, but it is hoped that we may be able to run a national event in 2010 and be involved in the sprint and middle distance championships in 2009.

There will be some difficult times and we need to be careful with expenditure, but recruitment is a must. Land access is likely to get more difficult, however we have new

areas that are not yet ready, and will also need mapping. This is a strong club and exciting things are happening, and progress will continue.

Chairman's Report from AGM

I am very grateful to Chris Phillips for representing me tonight, yet again! I am sorry not to be with you for our A.G.M. and partake of the social side tonight. But, I will be thinking of you as I would much rather be there, than confined to my bed!

I won't keep you long with my report and only want to highlight a couple of matters.

We have had a good year, both on the Committee and in the sporting field. I particularly want to mention the work being carried out by a small group, the Junior Development Team of Judith Holt, Lee Powell, Roger Edwards and a small number of others

We are no different to other clubs, nationally, in that maintaining a good base of young people seems extremely difficult. They join with their parents when quite young, but then drift off to more "hip, trendy, hot, now," sports of football, rugby, etc., or maybe the computer. NOC have bucked the trend in the East Midlands and we could learn a lot from them. They have a successful youth team, organised and coached by probably no more than two or three NOC members.

For years we have been talking about doing something, but lacked the resources or the will to do it. Now we have the Junior Development Team and they are already, in a very short time, making headway. We have fielded a team in the "Peter Palmer Relays" this year. Congratulations to our Club runners there. We also hope to field a youth team in the "Yvette Baker Trophy" on the

12th November. The Development Team has also set up a number of coaching sessions, open to all LEI members. Check the LEI website for the latest details

This, in itself, is a great achievement for LEI. I particularly want to thank Judith and Lee for their commitment to our youth. I hope you will support their efforts in any way you can to ensure we can continue to enter the local and national youth events and maintain a good base of young Club members.

The Committee has moved on to a new, less onerous, timetable of meetings. This has been explained fully in LEI News. What it does is allows us to spend less time going over the same issues month after month and to concentrate more on areas that need attention. Di and I had accepted an invitation to join Roger and Margaret Keeling of DVO for a few days in Venice as a part of their 40th Wedding Anniversary celebrations. This was planned without realising that our trip coincided with the event. With bags packed ready for an early start Pete Hornsby arrived to collect maps for the Bagworth C4 event. During the course of conversation he commented on how lucky we were to be able to take part in the Venice Street 'O.' Imagine my consternation! Surely he had the wrong weekend? We were under the impression that this event was over the half term weekend at the end of October. DVO went last year and they always go away over half term!

What is it?

This is an award scheme to encourage and reward young orienteers who are new to the sport.

How does it work?

This is a four stage incentive scheme based on participants successfully locating controls. The four stages are as follows:

♦ Acorn Certificate - 10 controls

♦ Tree Award - 25 controls

- 50 controls

♦ Wood Award - 75 controls

♦ Forest Award - 100 controls

The Acorn certificate is a quick introductory incentive

Copse Award

The awards are achieved in blocks of 25 controls. For each award a multi coloured woven badge and an A4 certificate is awarded. The certificate is free but there is

a charge for the badge of £1.50.

Achievement is monitored by recording controls on a progress card, called a log book. Controls located for one award count towards the next

How do I earn a control?

Coaching sessions will be allocated a set number of controls that you can count towards an award. These will be agreed by the lead coach at the coaching session and may vary from one coaching session to another. If you are competing in an event, every control you visit will count as one control. You may only count one course from any event. All claimed for controls must be signed off on your log book by a member of the Development Committee.

How do I get my award?

Simply take your fully signed log book and £1.50 to the club shop at an event and you can get a certificate and badge.

Summer League 2007



The 2006 summer league is behind us and becoming a distant memory. My joint

coordinator has provided results and statistics and his own observations. When Vernon & Geraldine Davis moved away Mark Foxwell expressed an interest in looking after the summer league but had very little experience of the considerations that go into working out a balanced programme.

I therefore offered to share this joint role to show him the ropes but since putting together the programme and finding the event organisers this has been very much Mark's baby with him distributing the equipment and doing the results. I am sure that you will agree with me that he has done an excellent job. I now feel he is ready to be turned loose on you all by himself.

I have helped him put together recommendations for this year's programme but will now bow out and let him get on with it. I and the other previous coordinators are always around if any advice is sought.

Last year we had joint events with LOG and OD which worked very well, both giving us additional areas, and providing two events which we did not need to organise. This year we will also have joint events with DVO. Strangely enough all the areas we visit in these 'foreign' patches are nearer than some of our own, down in the far south of our own territory.

DVO events are on Fridays so we will be offering 2 Friday events in our league for the first time. Friday nights may not be popular with some members but that can be said for every night where commitments clash and we are recommending trying this for at least one season. Our league is based on the best few events out of a longer programme which means no one is disadvantaged by events on any particular night when they cannot attend.

We will also have two Sunday events in the summer league as we have for the last few years. Some members cannot make midweek evenings and for those who do not travel to distant events this means no sport during the summer unless the club is staging one of its summer C4s. As things stand the ones we have chosen do not clash with other EMOA or National fixtures but if local clubs arrange anything belatedly, we have found in the recent past that we still attract enough members to justify the effort.

National Forest Trophy Event

LEI are to stage the 10th running of the National Forest Trophy in March and to celebrate this anniversary we have agreed a sponsorship deal with the National Forest Company. We are to use this to advertise the event to the general public to try and attract novices, particularly families.

The Club's development team will be on hand to assist the beginners and we hope to boost our membership by mentoring these potential recruits throughout the summer.

Over and above the normal helpers we will be seeking volunteers to help assist these novices (contact Chris Phillips to volunteer).

We are to advertise in the local press and I still require details of some local papers especially those within 20 miles of the event area. (title and contact telephone number or email)

We have got Birstall, Wanlip, Mountsorrel, Rothley, Loughborough and Glenfield covered but what about Markfield, Groby, Ratby, Thornton etc?)

I have details of the Coalville paper and can pursue this but any more suggestion?

We are also working with the National Forest to involve radio and the major regional papers.

This is a once-in-a-long time chance to really put the sport and the club on the map and try and win some new members and I hope you all can help in some way. The event will be partially a come and try it for novice courses and partially a serious event

including a 15k Long O. It is not part of the East Midlands League so anyone who normally runs in a colour class will not lose out by having a go at the Long O. There will be two separate starts and whilst the novices will remain within Martinshaw the senior courses will use various blocks of woodland within the new National Forest, mostly Woodland Trust owned. The area has been extended and extensively remapped.

The entry fees have been reduced thanks to the sponsorship deal so no further discounts will be available to BOF members.

As part of our promotional effort we seek all members' assistance. We have produced several flyers: one is aimed at orienteers and will be circulated in the normal way but one is aimed at the general public and another at 'runners'. We have now approached 35 running clubs but if you are involved in one still see what you can do.

Out and About



I had the pleasant surprise during the autumn to see a large bird of prey in my garden.

It was the tawny owl which was once our most common breeding owl and is found throughout Britain but strangely not in Ireland. There were about 20,000 breeding pairs in the eighties but it is feared this may now be down to about 8,000. You are far more likely to hear one than see one.

They will live almost anywhere with old tall trees and are often found in churchyards being particularly fond of roosting in yews. The number of old trees is reducing not least as schools and churches have them felled for 'safety' reasons and this is a major problem for these birds. Whilst not strictly nocturnal they prefer hunting at night if there is a little light; normally just after nightfall when their prey is still about. They also very occasionally hunt during the day when desperate, but they do need quiet and falling rain muffles any sound being made by potential prey. It will eat almost anything it can get hold of and only rarely gets enough to feed its brood of up to five young. These are actually hatched progressively with the first egg being incubated whilst the hen is still laying and the smallest fledglings often fail to survive unless food is plentiful. Even the survivors rarely get past their first winter as food is of course scarce and they are chased from the territories of older birds.

This creature lives for about 18 years and as much as 21 but does not normally wander far from its territory which it will know intimately. This is just as well as their eyes and ears are little better than man's and they rely on knowing their patch inside out to avoid flying into objects and to know where food sources are. It is about 15 inches long with a wing span of over three feet and is a ruddy brown near chestnut

colour with a paler underside. This bird is the image seen in drawings of owls: it has facial feathers giving it the traditional spectacled look which probably gave rise to the saying 'wise old owl'. It is probably also the origin of the reputed twittwoo sound which is actually something of a myth. The male bird is the

source of the 'hoo-hoo, huh-hoo' sound often haunting woodland and the traditional noise is probably a male and female 'talking'

to each other as the female makes a sound something like ke-wick which the males normally responds to with a 'hoo'. Attempts are currently in hand to try and count how many of these birds are still about.

One creature getting ever rarer is the harmless grass snake; I last saw one about three years ago, sunning itself by a canal bank although I used to see them fairly often. Adders also seem thinner on the ground although I have seen a few this year including Fineshade, Bradgate and Watermead. I well remember my sighting which did come as a bit of a shock. I was walking across a headland in North Devon covered with bracken and gorse and there was little doubt as to what it was with its zigzag pattern along its back.

If anyone planning an event wants to be warned of areas to avoid I can let them know specific locations.

Adders often bask and are usually easier to find than grass snakes which do so much less frequently and are more normally found in dark damp places near water and are good swimmers. Most people are familiar with the renowned pattern of the adder but the grass snake is olive coloured with rows of black spots and a yellow collar. Adders occur throughout Britain in many habitats including sand dunes, moorland, heaths and most areas of rough ground with cover and sites for the creature to bask.

The adder is Britain's only poisonous snake and obviously needs to be treated with some caution, but there are many myths engrained in our culture. Adders are very shy and will normally be long gone by the time you arrive where they had been just minutes before.

They will always do their best to avoid people and large animals but, if threatened, the adder may bite. Adders see and hear very well but they can also sense vibration

with their bodies and smell the air with their tongues.

They grow to just over two feet in length and females are larger than the males (these have been recorded at nearly 3 foot). They are long lived creatures although we are not sure how long. Being cold

blooded they need little food and can go as long as 18 months without any.

This snake is a member of the viper family and is also known as the common viper. Unlike most reptiles, which lay eggs buried in the ground, the female adder carries the eggs inside her until they are about to hatch. During the laying process the soft eggs break revealing the live young, usually between 8 and 12 in number.

Adder bites can be fatal but deaths in normally healthy humans are extremely rare and to the best of my knowledge have not happened in Britain for many years. If you are bitten it is not recommended that you try to suck out the poison or apply a tourniquet contrary to popular myth. You should seek medical help but anti-toxins are

rarely necessary. April is a good month to see adders or is a month to take care as they will have emerged from hibernation and spend a much of their time basking in the sun. Once we get into summer the midday heat becomes too much for them and they are about as sun comes up but they disappear underground or into stone walling for long periods to avoid the intensity of the mid day sun.

Another snake we find in Britain is the smooth snake. This one is not venomous but is a constrictor in that it grabs and squeezes its prey. This creature is a bit picky and lives almost exclusively on the sandy heaths of southern England. It mainly eats other reptiles but will take young mammals. It is about the same size as an adder and can live over 35 years.

Snakes predators include some birds of prey and occasionally hedgehogs and their prey ranges from insects to common lizards and field voles.

The common lizard is well named if you know where to look for them and they abound in the forests of Northamptonshire. Full grown they are just less than six inches long, live about 5 years and eat mainly spiders.

Hen Harriers are quickly being driven towards extinction and whilst there are only about 800 pairs in Britain very few are in England apart from the Isle of Man. It is one of Britain's most endangered species and English Nature reports that it has vanished from the 12,000 acre Geltsdale Reserve in Cumbria. This reserve is surrounded by managed moorland and they suspect the activities of gamekeepers are responsible. Suspecting game keeper

activity, English Nature is to investigate several large private estates.

Prosecutions are rare but recently a keeper on a large Scottish estate pleaded guilty to shooting a hen harrier having been captured on film and was fined £2000. Whilst this is a considerable sum if found from his own resources were any landowner to compensate an employee for any fines incurred they would probably consider it fairly cheap to maintain stocks of valuable game birds. The Royal Society for the Protection of Birds in Scotland claims that hundreds of hen harriers have been systematically killed over the last decade.

predation by 85%. Few estates are prepared to go to the trouble of doing so.

Only six pairs were recorded as successfully

breeding in 2001 and there is an apparent disparity between the successes of the birds on adjoining moorland areas where the only obvious difference is the attitude of the landowners. One such location under constant review is the Forest of Bowland near to my climbing club's cottage in Clapham.

After privatisation United Utilities became the owners of the old Water Board area which was opened to the public and has a resident RSPB warden and is where five of the successful broads were found.

The following year a pair of hen harriers raised a clutch in Cornwall, the first time for over 150 years. These were probably immigrants from Spain but with only 6 other recorded breeding successes by this bird throughout England in 2002 it was a good sign.

During the years to 2006 numbers increased slowly in England but this is not as healthy as it sounds as they were virtually all in Bowland more of which is now open to the public under Right to Roam.

In the Peak District 5 chicks took wing from one brood last year, only the second family in the area for 130 years. This was due to the valiant efforts of the mother as the male vanished shortly after the eggs were laid. Of 22 breeding attempts last year 12 nests produced 46 young.

Whilst some creatures are getting rarer other are becoming more common some of which are not very welcome. As our waters warm, a day at the seaside with a swim in the surf may be a little less inviting. Quite apart from increased numbers of jelly fish, there have been several unconfirmed but fairly

reliable sightings of great white sharks from

the Scillies up to the Scottish Tslands and during last year fishermen off the coast of Northumberland and Durham a large

porbeagle. There have also been occasional sightings of killer whales.

Another unwelcome visitor is a moth accidentally imported into Britain on young oak trees which has started successfully breeding thanks to our warmer climate. This moth can strip the leaves from oak trees but more worryingly it has toxins in its hairs which can be fatal to humans.

Pest control officers in breathing equipment are trying to eradicate them wherever they appear but the hairs can easily break off and become windborne causing rashes and conjunctivitis and if inhaled far more dangerous ailments.

The oak progressive moth as it is called is presently being found in the area round Kew Gardens where trees imported for a housing estate are thought to be the source.

Access Development Report



An old problem which has reared its head again is that of Natural England, Despite the

fact that we have been orienteering without problem on Beacon Hill for about 40 years and the flora has coped with our occasional visits without any detriment and the birds do not seem to mind our presence and we always avoid any areas of ground nesting birds either by marking areas out of bounds or by avoiding sensitive months, Natural England are now trying to exclude us from it for much of the year. The park management plan envisaged orienteering in the park and we had some initial words with the wardens to assist in putting in a permanent course for youth groups etc. This is on hold till the map settles down given the programme of works there. Paperwork we received for the New Year event suggested English Nature, or Natural England as it now is, will ban any orienteering from the beginning of March till the end of August. Being the environmentalist I am I am surprised that they think birds will be nesting in August.

If this policy is to prevail we can forget a permanent course. School and scout groups etc will not turn out in the winter and in any event normally do so in an evening and the dates allowed in future will have dark nights. Our summer league events will also have to go.

As English Nature is no more, I had hoped the new regime would be more user-friendly as the government and all agencies are trying to encourage people to take exercise but it seems not. I have asked the people at County Hall to talk to them and it will be on the agenda of the next Access Forum which I have just been elected to Chair for a further period. We are also to set up a regional meeting with the new head of Natural England which will give me another opportunity to raise this issue.

Another problem remains that of Grace Dieu. New shooting tenants have the rights to 'Gracedieu Woods' but in reality they can only shoot in that part known as High Sharpley. However the land agent will not give us permission to use any of their woods unless the shooters concur and they cannot seem to understand that we do not need to go within half a mile of their activities. For reasons of circumstance when this blew up our President is in contact on this issue but I am afraid even with his persuasive powers progress is very slow to stop.

On a more encouraging note, 49 blocks of woodland are under review as potential sites for events. Given lack of mappers and members and manpower to stage events down there many in the Rutland and Northampton area are on hold.

Of those I am actively pursuing I give details below. In addition we have casual permission for a large block linking Benscliffe to Bradgate and we are to try and map the area. We do appear to have negotiated new facilities for parking which will service this area and also Bradgate Park. We expect to use it for our next event

there

There are also numerous smaller tender schemes around the National Forest which can be added to existing maps.

In the medium term we are currently mapping two sizeable new areas both large enough for C4s. On is around Lount based from Staunton Harold which is almost complete and the other is land in a number of blocks which could be used with Willesley. Shellbrook Wood is Forestry Commission and doubles the size of Willesley but the links between the two are not good and parking is a problem. In addition the same amount of land again is available north of Shellbrook and is big enough for events from Moira where the Community Centre has adequate parking and is only a few hundred yards from the area. Shellbrook could be used in conjunction with this area to make it big enough for a C4. The overall area is enormous. Mapping is underway.

In the short term the new map of Ratby with its extensions is now complete and ready for use at the National Forest Event this year. Last minute changes will be required as Woodland Trust continue to actively manage the area.

For the longer term:-

Church View Wood and Wynn's Wood, near Swepstone

This large (100 acres) scheme is a most attractive scheme in terms of its size and the wide range of woodland habitat types that will be created. It is 300 yards from the Odd House Pub which has a large car

park and caravanning field and should be able to host events. The aims of the scheme are to enhance the landscape, creating mixed broadleaf woodland consisting of a number of habitats: 70 acres of mixed broadleaved woodland ten of commercial poplar, four of native wet woodland, an orchard (three acres) and a grassland area of a similar size. The site is visible from the Measham to Swepstone Road, two footpaths that bisect the site and from nearby Swepstone. They will allow access to 94% of the site, excluding the orchard and the grassland next to Valley Farm. The site lies opposite a Tender Scheme (Nethercote Farm Wood, about 70 acres, planted in 2005/06) and helps to establish a significant wooded area in this part of The National Forest. The site has climb and ponds and existing copses and old hedgerows with mature trees in addition to the new plantings going in. Together with successful applications at Tempe Farm and Gilwiskaw Valley, both of which are talking to us about possible use, these woodlands cover over 300 acres and will be visible by many people and have huge landscape impact. I have had a site meeting with the agents and have visited the following two additional schemes with real hopes of new event areas but Nethercote may not be so easy to add.

RRRRRRRRRR

Tempe Farm, near Swepstone,

This 140 acre scheme comprises new broadleaved woodland (100 acres), a little new parkland and the creation of an area of 40 acres wet unimproved grassland. Works include the creation of a large otter holt and

bluebells. In order to create a true wet grassland habitat, existing water features will be restored, man-made drains broken and shallow scrapes excavated. This will serve to raise the water table and restore (over time) past water levels when the field occasionally flooded. They will pollard and plant a number of willows and create a buffer strip adjacent to the stream. There will be access to 95% of the site - excluding the parkland and the meadow side bank of Gilwiskaw Brook. The site links to the new woodland at Gilwiskaw Wood (see below).

Gilwiskaw Wood, near Swepstone, Leicestershire

Nestled up against the woodland at Tempe Farm (see above), this 37 acres scheme adds greatly to creating a diverse and extensive woodland. The scheme comprises 25 acres of mixed broadleaf/conifer woodland some nature conservation rich wetland adjacent to Gilwiskaw Brook. The main aims are to create a site primarily for landscape and conservation objectives. An additional objective, and one that is unique to this scheme, is the inclusion of trees (such as particularly "white" varieties of Silver birch and "red" Horse chestnuts), which will stand out for the partially sighted. The owner will install five log seats set around unusual trees. The owner has made a conscious effort to increase the nature conservation interests of the land next to Gilwiskaw Brook.

Both the above sites are managed by the same agent with whom I have discussed the prospects which seem quite positive. The

schemes are generally supportive but have wildlife / nesting bird concerns which I think I have satisfied. The agent is to talk to them again and all being well set up a meeting and provide planting diagrams. These are attractive sites but parking may be a problem.

Owston Woods

260 Acres of Forest Enterprise woods, Chris Phillips and I did an initial visit which was not encouraging. Parking would be very difficult. A further detailed survey and enquiries show it as an SSSI protecting wet woodland plants. These extensive woods are not as bad as they initially seem when looking in. I have now been through them and whilst the rides are very wet they are being opened up by coppicing to help them dry out to an extent. Under the canopy there is not a lot of bramble but the woods are badly managed and a lot of deadwood clutters the ground. I will ask FE if we could use it just to test the water but I have doubts both on permission and suitability although we would like a sizeable site to the Rutland side of our patch for larger events. This wood is actually in Leicestershire but forms the border with Rutland

Oakham Tops (between Braunston and Oakham)

Mapping underway incorporating two blocks slightly separated but with car parking possibilities between them. The first comprises two Woodland Trust woods (Gorse Field Wood 21 Acres and Harris Grove & Ball's Meadow 14 Acres) and some adjoining

fields. GFW is a valley with mature copses to both sides and a field through the centre with landforms, a pond and numerous clumps of gorse. It can be accessed from the north via a public footpath from the road on which the other block is located (The Seek) where there is some off road parking. To the east there are disused meadows which could be added linking it to a primary school with sufficient parking for a C5. To the south HG&BM is a steeply sloping hill with land features and newly planted trees and fence enclosed copses. All together without any farmers' fields we are looking at about 50 acres. The Seek is about a third of a mile from the first block and is about 25 acres of now mature woodlands with rides. Steeply sloping up from a wooded stream levelling into a dome dropping away in the other direction. Woodland Trust property. OK for electronic C5 event

Poplar House Farm Woodland, near Bagworth,

This 60 acre scheme sits on the sides of a low hill and involves the planting of mixed broadleaved woodland. The site is visible from the PROW (a combined bridleway and part of the Ivanhoe Way). The site is also visible from the B582. The best views from the site are to the south west, in particular towards the churches at Nailstone and Market Bosworth. There will be 100% informal access to the site, a new public footpath and a permissive horse riding). The new footpath will create an attractive circular route off the Ivanhoe Way.

This site is contracted to support orienteering as is the next prospect. I have

spoken to the agent and will be meeting with him again. There is a second site which is in DVO country but with the same agent I will initially include it in my discussions with him. It is Crossroads Wood, near Coton in the Elms, Derbyshire, a 35 acre scheme lying immediately to the west of the woodlands created at Grangewood Farm and near to. but not touching, the woodlands at Beehive Farm and Coton in the Flms. The scheme adds to a wooded "mosaic" of 450 acres of woodland planted in the area since the birth of the Forest in 1995. The site is very visible from the roads that extend on three sides and has immediate presence and significant landscape impact. The site comprises one field that was most recently set to oil seed rape. Although the field appears to be relatively flat there is higher ground towards to the north east corner. The broader landscape is of a mixed agricultural and wooded setting with nearby woodlands at Beehive Farm and Grangewood being particularly prominent. There will be 100% informal access, a new public footpath, permissive horse riding and an orienteering route. The applicant will create shallow pools, gap up hedging and plant four native Black poplars.

The agent handling these has been responsible for a number of other larger schemes around Thornton and Bagworth which are now maturing and I am to go round them with him to see which others may be useable. There are certainly two big enough for C5s and one a possible C4.

It seems the various agents will have time to help us with these prospects as there is not to be a tender round this year. The National

Forest Company has recently announced that the Tender Scheme will not operate in 2007/08. The reason for this decision is that the regulations underpinning the new Rural Development Programme for England (the strategy which determines woodland creation and countryside management schemes in England), have not yet been approved by the European Parliament. The date by which the programme will be approved, and the criteria for its new schemes, are not yet known. As part of this process, the NFC needs to ensure that any scheme it wants to run as part of the RDPE meets the latter's legal and financial

requirements. Therefore, the NFC considered that would not be possible to operate the Scheme without the information both it and applicants need in order to make clear and long lasting decisions on possible Tender Scheme proposals.

This year they will use such resources as they have to target support for projects within the forest such as our March event and on creating or encouraging links and improvements to the existing infrastructure of the forest.
