Also, a huge congratulations to lain Phillips, who was selected for the British Orienteering Team to compete at the European Trail Orienteering Championships in Slovakia.

I am on the lookout for a couple of volunteers to help look after the juniors at the Peter Palmer Junior Relays on the 8th/9th September. It will suit those members who love volunteering for very unusual and quirky events.

Safeguarding

As a club, we are committed to ensuring the safeguarding and welfare of all those involved in our sport. As the LEI Club Welfare Officer, I am pleased to report that British Orienteering will now be sending all Club Welfare Officers regular updates to ensure that we are aware of the latest safeguarding policies and practices, which, in turn, I will share with you.

British Orienteering's primary responsibility is to ensure safeguarding concerns, and any relevant information, are reported and, where appropriate, passed onto the police and children's social care without delay. One οf the mechanisms that British Orienteering has to facilitate the reporting

of potential safeguarding concerns is a safeguarding email address, which allows individuals to directly report concerns to the Lead Safeguarding Officer. Reports could include any concerns about the welfare children, either orienteering or outside of orienteering. and any concerns over adult behaviour related to the welfare of children. Therefore, if you have any safeguarding concerns now or in the future, could you please contact British Orienteering directly on their safeguarding email address, which safeguarding@britishorienteering.org.uk.

General Data Protection Regulations (GDPR)

Who we are:

Leicestershire Orienteering Club (LEI) are the East Midlands affiliated to Orienteering Association (EMOA) and the British Orienteering Federation (BOF). As a Club, we hold certain personal information (known as 'personal data') about the club members and participants of club organised events. Most of the data held and processed by the Club, in running the Club, will be personal data. (In other words, it is information from which you, as an individual, can be identified.)

What information we collect about you

In becoming a member of LEI, or attending LEI organised events/ activities, we may hold some or all of the following information about you:

- Name and date of birth/age group
- Address
- Gender
- Email address
- BOF membership number
- Car registration number
- Start/ race times/ courses
- Doctor's name and address.
- Medical conditions/ medication
- Phone number (s)
- E-card number
- Next of kin

How we use that information:

The Club has a legitimate interest in holding and processing the above information about you, as it is needed for us to properly administer the club and events we organise, including the levy due to BOF & EMOA as a result of the events and activities we hold. We will not collect any personal data from you that we do not need.

Personal data relating to the Club membership and event participation is held on paper and on computer systems. As the 'data controller', the Club must process this information fairly and lawfully.

Who we share it with:

We are not allowed to disclose personal data about you to other parties, except:

- for the purposes of registering and administering your involvement in the sport;
- where you have given your consent.

In the administering of the sport, we may share your data with other clubs and organisations involved in event entries (e.g. Fabian4 and Si Entries) and also participation and results data with BOF and FMOA.

How long we keep personal data for:

We will retain your membership data for



such time as you are a member registered with LEI and BOF, and will then delete your information as follows:

 Four years after the individual has ceased to be a member of the club.

Any personal data collected as part of LEI organised events/ activity will be deleted as follows:

 1 month following the event or 4 years for non- BOF members.

NB Event result data will continue to be available via the LEI or BOF websites.

Your rights:

You have the right to see personal data that is held about you and a right to have a copy provided to you, or someone else on your behalf, in a machine readable (namely, digital) format. If, at any point, you believe that the personal data we hold about you is inaccurate/wrong, you can ask to have it corrected. You can require the Club to restrict/limit the processing of your personal data in certain circumstances, for example, whilst a complaint about its accuracy is being resolved. You can object to your personal data being processed.

Where you have given us your consent to process your personal data, you can withdraw that consent at any time by notifying us (see 'Who to contact' below). You can request that your personal data is deleted altogether.

You should be aware that taking any of the above steps could impact your ability to participate in the sport and club activities.

Information will generally be provided to you free of charge.

If you wish to:

- see your personal data or to exercise any of the rights mentioned above, and/or
- make a complaint about how we have handled your personal data

please contact the Club Secretary or Club Chairman by email (emails available on the club website. (www.leioc.org.uk)

Making a complaint to the Information Commissioner's Office:

If you are not satisfied with our response to any query you raise with us, or you believe we are processing your personal data in a way which is inconsistent with the law, you can complain to the Information Commissioner's Office, whose helpline number is: 0303 123 1113. (www.ico.org.uk)

Send a Text Message to 999

On a recent first aid course, we learnt of an extra safety facility, especially useful for those who spend time in the hills or remote places.

It is possible to register your mobile phone number with the emergency services, so that as well as calling them on 999, you can send a text message. In an area with poor or intermittent reception, a text will get through better than a call. If you find yourself in a situation where you don't want others to know you are sending for help, e.g. contacting the police, a text can be sent silently.

To register your mobile, send a one word

text message *register* to 999. You will receive an automated reply explaining the system. You need to read it and then text *yes* in reply. You then receive a second message confirming you are registered.

If you need to use the text service, you should give the same information as you would when calling: the service you require; details of the incident; where you are and any other information to assist in locating you.

Hill Walkers Warned about Magnets in Clothing

Magnets in outdoor clothing and on phone covers raise the risk of hill walkers navigational making Mountaineering Scotland has warned. The aroup said magnets were increasingly being used as fastenings on items such as gloves. Mountaineering Scotland said a recent incident in Glen Shee was thought to have been caused by a magnetic fastening deflecting a compass needle. It said a group of walkers had wrongly headed east instead of west. They then became disorientated in low cloud and ended up miles away from a road that would have led them to safetv.

Heather Morning, Mountain Safety Adviser for Mountaineering Scotland, said: Fortunately no-one was hurt - just pride dented - but it could have turned out so much worse, had mountain conditions been more severe. The reason for the error was the compass. It had been stored in a pocket next to a mobile phone in a case which had a magnetic closure on it, and the magnet had reversed the polarity of the compass needle, so that the north arrow pointed south.

The phenomenon of reversed polarity has publicised previously mountaineering circles. People are advised to keep their compasses well from mobile phones. Mountaineering Scotland said it was concerned by the growing use of magnetic closures in outdoor clothing. Ms. Morning said: Modern technology is great. The resources available now to



keep us warm and safe in the mountains have never been better. But more joined-up thinking is needed between outdoor clothing manufacturers and mountain users to avoid potentially life-threatening consequences.



Out and About



The Summer League had its usual start - wet. οf course. We however. have. iust some had great sunny days. and flowers and blossoms abound. with birds the suddenly in overdrive.

I was lucky enough to watch water voles in a stream near Winchester recently and it is good to see them making a bit of a comeback. If going to Kielder Water, you may be lucky enough to see this old friend: Ratty is back! Over 500 water voles have been released there in two waves over the last 12 months. As otters repopulate our rivers and out-compete mink, the voles are creeping back. There are quite a lot of otters in Leicestershire now, so hopefully the voles will return as well.

I used to delight in the occasional sightings of Peregrine Falcons when out on the rocky moors, but I see them fairly frequently in the heart of Leicester these days. Many of our major cities have them breeding on high rooftops and thriving off the readily available prey, the pigeons. It is, perhaps, as well, as increasing numbers of raptors are being killed in our rural areas.

It might not surprise you, but animals breed as their numbers increase and, as habitats shrink, they have learned to adapt to the areas where we would often prefer they stayed out of. They are invading our parks and, increasingly, our gardens as the natural countryside dwindles. The fox is a familiar figure in our urban areas, but the Muntjac, our

smallest deer, is almost as common in some urban areas and badgers in some others.

One of our few native deer, the roe deer was largely extinct in many areas of England 50 years ago, but names associated with it were everywhere. How many pubs called the Roebuck or the Buck Inn have you come across? They making a comeback are now woodland cover is increased, and are greatly helped by the reduction in gaps between woodland blocks, which is being brought about by the creation of community woodlands near habitation. They are now widespread in many areas where they had been missing for years and there are thought to be between 350,000 and 500,000 of them now in Britain. You can see how common they once were, not only in the names of pubs but also the names of villages like Bucknall. Buckfast. Buckfastleigh. Buckenham, Buckhorn. Buckhaven. Buckerell, Buckminster, Buckden and Buckland. It is odd how some animal names invade our language.

Deer are a very real problem. In our remaining wild areas, they prevent natural regeneration of plants and trees. and closer to home they can also cause problems. Given there is resistance to reintroducing wolves or lynx, we need to find other ways to manage the deer population, in particular both to keep them from areas we do not want to see them but also to ensure their welfare. protecting them from starvation by overgrazing, and from injury in road traffic accidents. There are thought to be over 50,000 accidents involving deer across the country each year. The UK deer population is thought to be up to about six million



In the absence of a natural predator, sustainable management of deer usually means that they have to be culled. Approaching 400,000 are culled in the UK every year, but despite this and road kills, their population continues to grow.

Wolves would be a solution, but would also bring other problems. The wolf hasn't existed in the wild in Britain since the 1700s, but has never really left us. We 'wolf' down our food and 'keep the wolf from the door'. We suffer from 'lone wolf' attacks, but sometimes 'crv wolf'. have a 'wolf in sheep's clothing' and have been 'thrown to the wolves'. Also, women are all too familiar with 'wolf whistles'. We have the poisonous plant 'wolf's bane', so named as it is dangerous, and there is a plant named as 'wolf-like' because it survives in remote wild places. As such, it was described by the Latin word pronounced 'loopin' (the Lupin, genius lupinus)

Closer to home I am getting increasing opportunities to get up close and personal with wildlife. Right on our doorstep, we have over 100 acres of open land with mature woodland, new plantings, streams, ponds, ditches, bogs and hills, etc., mostly only made available to us recently. It would make a great orienteering area, but for the blocks being separated by busy roads. There is a new stretch of open access wild land (Brookside Meadows) along about 1K of Rothley Brook, and just across the A46 slip road another 20 acres of wooded and landscaped land will be opened up within the next 12 months (Clanfelde Hills). At the other end of that block, and just across Ratby Lane, a new 8 acre nature reserve, full of landform features, has been opened, backing onto the half mile long Fishley Belt block of woodland, with ponds and streams. Linking all these, there are rights of way, or permissive paths, which also lead out into the existing green areas of Glenfield.

I am a member of the planning committee at Blaby and am appalled at the rate of house building in green spaces. There is, however, a massive shortfall in home provision, the demographic and political reasons for which we will not go into. It is down to the government to use the fiscal system to reward and encourage more 'brown field' developments. We do not need to further relax the planning rules; already have builders enouah permissions, they just don't build them out. One thing we can do, as planners, is ensure that all larger developments include a good amount of green space that it is not always over manicured, and that green corridors are left to allow wildlife to migrate. By working with the developers at Optimus Point, we have achieved just that, and when New Lubbesthorpe is complete, that will also have a lot of off-road paths, green corridors and open spaces.

Thanks, Rov. for organising the food and the guiz of 4 photos of watery O areas. Trophies are presented for the winter/summer league, etc. and green jackets for event team members. Have they won the Augusta Masters golf tournament? No, the idea is that 'the public might distinguish club members who are a reliable source of information'. If you have time to be distracted, try Googling 'Golf's Green Jacket' for titbits of history and gossip. The winner of the first tournament in 1934 was Horton Smith and years later his jacket was sold at auction for \$6.900,000. A silver salver was awarded to Peter Leake for lots of mapping, a trophy for Roger Phillips for the job of club captain and for social media information, and to an unsung hero. Alistair Patterson, for the 24 events where he has collected in controls. The infamous clock trophy is awarded to the LEI person who takes the longest time to finish an O course in an LEI area without retiring, being injured or popping in for a swift pint half way round. Please confirm arrangements, either with the organiser or league coordinator. League scores are on standard handicaps, giving everyone a chance of success in the league if they perform as well as their age would suggest they should. Overall, it is the best 10 events to count with a sub league of sprint/urban events, with the best 4 counting. All events include a technical course. There will always be an introductory level course for novices and young children, and where practical an intermediate standard course.
